

# OUR PROGRAMS & PROJECTS

#### **SECTION SUMMARY**

Throughout the year, Ghana Development Community Association (GDCA) and its subsidiary partners, including School for Life, CLIP, Simli Radio, and Dalun Simli Centre, have implemented numerous projects aligned with GDCA's values, mission, and core principles.

GDCA has focused on empowering marginalized communities in Northern Ghana through initiatives such as the Empowerment For Life (E4L), PARCS-TVET, ECSD, FtF RING SS, WE GAIN, Advancing Women Entrepreneurs for Northern Ghana (AWE4NG), and the Artificial Intelligence for Agriculture and Food Security project.

Changing Life in Innovative Partnerships (CLIP) has provided innovative and SMART solutions to enhance economic empowerment and food security in Northern Ghana, bolstering climate change adaptability. Projects under CLIP include PACBAO, DINADANË Project, Supporting Agro-Pastoralism to Reinforce Social Cohesion in the Cross-border territories Ghana-Burkina Faso (SAPSOC III), and Go Adapt.

School For Life has dedicated efforts towards ensuring equitable access to relevant quality education in Ghana through projects such as CLEAR, CBE-Second Chance Project, Strengthening Accountability in Ghana Education System-Strengthening Activity (SAGES-SSA), GEOP, WEE-North, and SAGE.

Simli Radio has played a crucial role by producing and broadcasting approximately 2,000 programs annually, providing a platform for community voices to be heard and contributing to national debates. Projects facilitated by Simli Radio include the Accelerating Social and Behaviour Change Project (ASBC), Sustainable Development Goals Project (SDGs), Lively Minds Together, and Kpehi Saha (Shea nuts time).

Dalun Simli Centre serves as a hub for vocational and skills training in areas such as carpentry, masonry, dress-making, metalwork, and agro-processing. It has hosted various training sessions and important meetings, including the Land Commission Public Forum, visits from international groups such as Hald Edge Efterskole-Denmark and nurses from Denmark, courtesy visits from France Volontair, School For Life trainings, and meetings of the Join Simli Radio and Dalun Simli Centre Technical Committee, among others.

#### **Empowerment for Life (E4L) Program**



Empowerment for Life (E4L) program is based on the partnerships between **Ghana Venskab** and four local partners: **GDCA**, **School for Life (SfL)**, **YEFL Ghana and CLIP**. The program focuses on 4 thematic areas, and each local partner leads the areas of its expertise, GDCA leads in **Governance**, SfL in **Education**, YEFL in **Youth Empowerment** and CLIP in **Climate Change and Resilience**.

### Project to support the strengthening of Social Cohesion in Cross-border Territories (PARCS-TVET



The "Project to help strengthen social cohesion in strategic cross-border areas (PARCS)" project being implemented in cooperation with Acting for Life and Dalun Simli Centre. It is a 3-year project starting from 1 December 2022 to 30 November 2025. The Program includes trainings in Electrical installations (Domestic), Plumbing, Tiling, **Plaster** paneling, Beekeeping, Organic vegetable production, Organic poultry production, and Agro-processing.

## Empowering Communities through Skills Development (ECSD)



The ECSD initiative is part of the EU Aid Volunteers program. Its objective is to strengthen the capacities of the hosting resilience foster within organisations to communities facing distress. Each volunteer is previously trained to intervene in humanitarian contexts and is then project comprises deployed. The daily support organisational management, training sessions and dissemination promote volunteering events to and international exchanges.

Over the next five years, across Northern, Upper West, North East, and Upper East regions of Ghana, RING II will improve the nutritional status and resilience of vulnerable populations by enhancing local governance systems, optimizing resources to catalyze greater access to social services, and transforming the capacities of institutions to scale service delivery.

### Women Entrepreneurs Gain Access to Integrated Services through Agent Networks (WE GAIN)

The initiative sought to promote women's economic empowerment in Northern Ghana through a network of female digital financial services agents and leveraging MTN Ghana's mobile money platform. As one of the partners CSOs, GDCA delivers an integrated, market based, high-impact package of financial and non-financial information, product, services, and referrals to women entrepreneurs.

#### Advancing Women Entrepreneurs for Northern Ghana (AWE4NG)

The Project aims at empowering Women in Northern Ghana and improving their livelihoods through providing them entrepreneurship skills. It aims to enable the VSLAs that have been established by GDCA to record their savings and loans records digitally and share them with a formal financial insitiution in order to access to credit for business growth.

#### **Artificial Intelligence for Agriculture and Food Security project**


In this project, **GDCA** is working closely with small farmers as individuals and organisations to create and promote the use of an **online application to detect crops pests and diseases**. It will enable the farmers of the area to detect early crops diseases and pests; put in place preventive or control measures; gather data on crops diseases and improve their management.

#### **PACBAO**



The goal for the PACBAO project is to develop competitive, regional and inclusive livestock and meat value chains by enhancing West African pastoral and agropastoral livestock, integrating breeders into these value chains under income-generating conditions and meeting the meat demand of households in the region.

#### **DINADANË Project**



#### Supporting Agro-Pastoralism to Reinforce Social Cohesion in the Cross-border territories Ghana- Burkina Faso (SAPSOC III)

Implemented in collaboration with Acting for Life and funded by UKAid, the project promotes social cohesion and provides economic resilience for the agro-pastoral sector and border communities. The project also collaborates with key stakeholders including the traditional authorities, security agencies and the District Assemblies to build synergies to resolve issues that could bring conflict.

#### **GO ADAPT**



This project is implemented by **CLIP**, in partnership with YEFL Ghana and Ghana Venskab. The purpose of the intervention is to support an inclusive climate adaptation planning process from community level to district level, and to strengthen the adaptive capacity and resilience of smallholder farmers in vulnerable communities in Northern Ghana.

## Citizen-led Education Accountability and Responsiveness Project (CLEAR)



CLEAR is a consortium project led by School for Life with YEfL Ghana and GDCA as implementing partners. The project seeks to contribute to equitable access to quality basic education for children in deprived areas of Ghana by strengthening transparency and accountability.

#### **CBE-Second Chance Project**



Complementary Basic Education (CBE) is **School for Life's flagship** program. The program is aimed at giving out of school children beyond school starting age an opportunity to attain **basic literacy and numeracy** in their mother tongue. Community based classes held over nine months, teach basic functional literacy and numeracy skills in the mother tongue of students.

## Strengthening Accountability in Ghana Education System-Strengthening Activity (SAGES-SSA)



SAGES-SSA is a project founded by USAID that aims to improve primary education service delivery through institutionalizing accountability in the primary education system. Its activities are meant to strengthen educational accountability; and to increase the performance of education system actors and of their interactions with each other.

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## Accelerating Social and Behaviour Change Project(ASBC)



As part of the **Ghana Community Radio Network**, Dalun Simli Radio implement the ASBC Project, founded by USAID. The ASBC activity focuses particularly on increasing the adoption of priority gateway behaviors in the areas of maternal, newborn and child health; sexual and reproductive health; malaria; COVID-19; and WASH.

#### Sustainable Development Goals Project (SDGs)



Funded by Crossing Borders in Denmark through Ghana Community Radio Network (GCRN), the SDGs project seek to localize the Sustainable Development Goals in the communities, the believe here is that, SDGs maybe not be understood properly by community members and this affected their achievement.

#### **Lively Minds Together**



Lively Minds Together is a project sponsored by Lively Minds and sees Dalun Simli Radio as one of its implementing partners. The project started in response to the covid 19, its episodes are run in 16 local languages and cover a range of ECD topics to assist parents to support the development of their children, ensuring they become school ready.

#### Kpehi Saha(Shea nuts time)



The project is founded by SOLIDARIDAD and started in 2022. It educates listeners on safety measures in the collecting and processing of shea nuts, the importance of the shea tree, the risks of deforestation, and other issues affecting the supply chain.

#### **SECTION SUMMARY**

Guided by its four strategic goals, GDCA has successfully made a significant impact in the communities where it operates through the implementation of various projects and programs. This impact spans across diverse fields and interventions.

GDCA has fostered a resilient and empowered society by collaborating with other CSOs to promote inclusive development. 







Nkuteen Tasemi and many other farmers are faced with challenges in rain-fed crop production due to climate change, provided with resources (i.e. chain link fencing and a water pump), Nkuteen diversified her livelihood and started selling dry-season vegetables. Her story shows the power of sustainable agricultural practices.

#### **STORIES OF IMPACT**

"The CBE has helped me a lot. It broke the poor perception I had of myself that I could not teach. It took away the low self-esteem I had of myself and shyness away. It built my confidence, especially the stamina to stand in front of people to talk or do a presentation"- Mariam Dauda, CBE-Second Chance Project

Through diligent saving of her monthly stipend and community contributions, she saved to purchase a Teacher Training Form last year and gained admission into the teacher training college. Currently, Mariam is pursuing a Bachelor of Education (B.ED) at the Agogo Presbyterian Women's College of Education.

"I had always harbored the dream of coming a journalist, but my dream came true after the E4L programme trained me as a citizen journalist where I could advocated for accountability in the generation and utilization of district IGF. 


















#### **SECTION SUMMARY**

The total annual turnover represents the entire income or revenue generated by the NGO over the course of a fiscal year.

In the section below, it is showed how the different project and program contributed to GDCA's turnover for 2023.


- E4L Phase IV: This program contributes the highest percentage to the annual turnover, accounting for 75.09% of the total. This indicates that E4L Phase IV is the primary revenue-generating initiative for the NGO.
- RING II: This project contributes 10.9% to the turnover.
- PARCS: Contributes 8.4% to the turnover, indicating it is another substantial contributor to the NGO's income.
- PACBAO: This project contributes 3.6% to the turnover, representing a moderate but noticeable portion.
- ECSD Project, E4L Tolon, WE GAIN, DSG4NG: These projects each contribute smaller percentages (ranging from 0.4% to 0.6%) to the turnover. Collectively they represent diversified sources of funding for the NGO.


Moreover, the GDCA Programmes Portfolio reveals a strategic investment distribution across various projects. E4L PHASE IV dominates with 66.4%, highlighting its central importance. Other notable allocations include PARCS (10.0%) and Core Funding (7.8%), reflecting significant commitments to specific initiatives and foundational support. Smaller allocations are directed towards projects such as RING II Systems Strengthening (6.7%), PACBAO (5.9%), and several others, indicating a balanced approach to portfolio management with varied focuses on innovation, development, and operational support.

Through this report GDCA aims at sharing this breakdown with stakeholders (donors, board members, partners) to enhance transparency and accountability, and to demonstrate how funds are utilized across different programs to achieve the NGO's mission.
